### WHY DO WE SEEK TO GROW?

## THE REV. CHRIS DUNCAN RECTOR

An old priest friend once told me, "Chris, every congregation will tell you that they want to grow, but then they will fight you tooth and nail to not grow." First let me say, this has not been my experience at St. James and is quite frankly a cynical reflection by that priest. However, this statement got me thinking. Why do we seek to grow as a congregation in the first place?

To answer this question, I am immediately drawn to scripture where we find example after example of our call to selflessly reach beyond ourselves in hospitality and evangelism, but no passage is as clear as the Great Commission as found in the Gospel of Matthew. Jesus directly ordered his followers, "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations…" And so, we seek to grow!

Now with this said, we must remember that we do not cause a congregation to grow. Only the Holy Spirit can do that by moving within a person's life. However, we can and must do our part as participants in this process. In other words, we can assist (or detract) from this possibility through our actions (or inactions). Earlier in Matthew's gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples that in welcoming others we are in fact welcoming Christ himself. This led me to ponder, "How would our Sundays at St. James change if we had a deep commitment to welcoming everyone that walked through our door, both new and long tenured, as if we were welcoming Christ? Furthermore, how would the world beyond our doors change if we treated strangers or even our enemies in a similar fashion?"

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:19-20



Yes, we at St. James seek to grow, but not out of ego or a desire to increase pledging households. Instead, we seek to grow because the good news we have received from Christ is too good to be kept to ourselves and needs to be shared. We seek to grow because we do not conform to the world's hate and fear and isolation but rather, we seek to be transformed as we also transform the world through the Holy Spirit with love, grace, and mercy. We seek to grow because Christ is with us always and gives us courage to go and make disciples, even when it makes us uncomfortable. Which leads us back to the questions posed earlier: How would St. James and the world change if we had a deep commitment to welcoming everyone as if we were welcoming Christ? Furthermore, how will you help make this change happen?

### WHY DO WE SEEK TO GROW?

#### An Addendum: When will we go back to 9 am and 11 am Sunday Services?

Fr. Joe, the Interim Rector before me, moved St. James Church from four Sunday services (7:30 am, 9 am, 11 am, & 5 pm) down to three (8 am, 10:30 am, & 5 pm). Beginning with my very first Sunday back in July 2018, I have been asked, "When are we going to go back to the old schedule?" The answer is in the math!

When Fr. Joe made this move, it was because there is a lot of research that supported that decision. Psychologically speaking, if the church pews are not consistently 40% or more filled at a principal service (such as 9 am and 11 am), then a person subconsciously asks themselves, "What is wrong? Why is it so empty?" On the flip side, when a congregation is consistently 85% or more filled, then a person says to themselves, "There is no room for me. They don't need me." These principles apply to both new and long-tenured members alike and neither of these scenarios is good. Therefore, the answer to the question of when we are going back to the old schedule is when we are consistently around 85% full at the 10:30 a.m. service so that we will be at least 40% filled when the services split. Or once again, the answer is in the math!

# MANY HANDS (OF ALL SIZES) MAKE LIGHT WORK: OUTREACH ACROSS GENERATIONS

One of my first tasks soon after I started at St. James three years ago was to better understand the state and shape of the church's various outreach programs. Through numerous calls and emails, I began to piece together the structure, and more importantly, get to know many who had been (and continue to be) integral in serving our community. I asked lots of questions about what had gone well, what could be improved, and what this next chapter could hold.

Now, this was August 2020, one of the peaks of the pandemic, so those visioning questions were perhaps the most challenging. I got all sorts of responses, like "I don't know" and "that's a great question" and, my personal favorite, "I believe that's what you're supposed to figure out!" All understandable in such a difficult time. But I also heard from people of multiple life stages a common refrain: a longing to have younger members participate in the parish's various outreach ministries. Parents, in particular, expressed a desire to serve alongside their school-aged children.

Much to my excitement, the Outreach Committee shared this desire to facilitate inter-generational opportunities to serve; they sensed its importance on levels both parish and personal. So we started imagining what it might look like for regular outreach opportunities to become more family-friendly. Beyond explicitly inviting families to participate, we shifted the times to serve. Instead of working our food pantry on midweek afternoons, for instance, Saturdays became food bank distribution days. During the seemingly endless season of Covid, dozens of volunteers from 8to-88 would gather to register guests and hand out non-perishables. When regular programming began to return, the Outreach Committee also coordinated days dedicated to putting faith into action through projects amenable to all ages, and, often, these fell on a Sunday —a day when faith, family, and service were already at the fore.

### **OUTREACH ACROSS GENERATIONS**

Incredibly, we began to witness children and youth working shoulder-to-shoulder with the adults of the church. Together, they made greeting cards for individuals with developmental disabilities; they filled We Care snack bags to be offered to those in need of daily food; they put on gloves and began to pick up trash around downtown following a Sunday service. And if you ever attended one of St. James's monthly breakfast events, you'll have seen kindergarteners handing out utensils and jelly; third graders working with their parents to distribute groceries to folks who might need it; and high school juniors greeting neighbors experiencing homelessness.

Over the past couple of years at St. James, these sorts of scenes have become commonplace, even expected, but such inter-generational collaboration and connection is rare and coveted across denominations, with countless churches trying to curate the perfect environment for its growth. I am humbled to be able to witness these glorious snapshots of beauty and grace and power. And I pray that we might all come to appreciate each instance, each frozen pat of butter handed out by tiny hands, as a remarkable sign of the Spirit working in the life of that young person, in the life of their family, and in the life of the church.

Although I have only been working at the church for the last eighteen months, there is one thing that continues to impress me: St. James' fellowship. I have not been a part of such an amazing group of people that truly care about each other and their church. All the fellowship events and groups are well attended and flourishing under the leadership of each group. After attending at least one meeting of each ministry, I am overwhelmed by the members' dedication and diversity of options for all ages. With Covid-19 restrictions lifted, the fellowship at St. James has taken off with increased attendance at events, new events, and renewed energy.

Foyer Groups are back with a vengeance, with over 70 parishioners participating. Foyer Groups gather purely for social purposes to enjoy one another's company, strengthen bonds of community, and meet new church members. There is no agenda or plan, just casual fellowship, and a refreshing meal. Groups consist of a cross-section of the congregation including singles, couples, young people, and retired folks. This year we had the largest number of groups and members that we have had in several years.

The James Gang is comprised of mostly retired individuals in our community who gather monthly for outings to stay active, involved, and build new friendships within the church congregation.

The St. James Bad Girls Book Club is a women's group that meets monthly to read and discuss timely books, enjoy an informal meal, and socialize. This past spring the group had so much fun and enjoyed their discussion to the extent that they continued to meet throughout the summer and have some interesting books coming up in the fall. We are working to create new ministry areas and to bring back ones from the past. The Young Adults group is working to get restarted with renewed interest from new church members and prior attendees of this group. Another new ministry is one for "Empty Nesters" and is slated to kick off with a get-together aimed at this group. More details on these two ministries are to come.

I look forward to seeing you at our events and getting to know each of you a little better.

# **GUMB**

In June, the **Gumbo Committee** allocated \$10,000 to inreach, \$10,000 to outreach, and the remaining was kept for Gumbo 2024.

- In-Reach: St. James has ordered new stoles in five of the liturgical colors to complete the sets already purchased.
- Outreach: the Outreach Committee has received the funds and will use it to make grants in the community, including a portion of the funds to start a new partnership with Front Yard Bikes

Gumbo is St. James' premiere opportunity for fellowship and involvement while we invite our downtown neighbors and day school families into our church home for a gumbo luncheon. Funds raised are dedicated to outreach and special projects of the church. Fifty volunteers are needed at each Gumbo event during Lent to bring our "pop-up" gumbo shop to life. Volunteers answer phones, take orders, serve, cashier, wash dishes, and greet visitors. Mark your calendars for March 8, 2024, for the next Gumbo event.

# FROM THE VESTRY

As this issue of The Messenger arrives, the march towards Fall activities is well-underway.

One fall activity here at St. James is the Vestry nominating and election process. The **Vestry Nominating Committee** was formed during the June and July Vestry meetings and is accepting nominations until August 30 for the 2024 slate. Serving St. James on the Vestry has been a great privilege and honor in my life. I encourage each of you to thoughtfully consider participating in this process by nominating yourself or others for consideration. My thanks to the Vestry Nominating Committee, chaired by Kyle Landrem, for leading this effort.



The **St. James Day School,** the Church's largest ministry, is kicking off a great school year with enrollment, finances, and operations in a strong position. The Vestry approved the new School Board members in the summer months, and Tyler Gray will serve as the chair for this school year. On behalf of the Vestry, thank you to each of you for your service and commitment to the Day School.

In Capital Campaign news, the Day School will also return with beautiful new windows in Werlein Hall. The window installation began in May with the summer break with the final installation complete before school began. The insurance settlement for the Ministries Center roof failure has also been negotiated and accepted with guidance from legal counsel. All repairs have been made with the building fully operational. The Historic Tax Credit applications are proceeding through the state process for the Manship Ministries Center and Kilgore Hall. This program is of great financial benefit to the upkeep of the campus.

Last summer, the **Health and Safety Task Force** was created to examine our current practice in comparison to best practices on a variety of fronts. A report of efforts was provided to the Vestry noting the addition of AEDs and first aid kits to multiple locations in the campus, reorganizing the security detail, offering a health and safety training on first response interventions (i.e., Stop the Bleed and hands-only CPR), and updating locks on the church. While the task force has ended, the efforts to ensure the health and safety of the congregation, staff, and school remain an ongoing endeavor.

I look forward to seeing you at one of the many wonderful fall activities in the life of St. James!
