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WILL IT BE ADVENT 4 OR CHRISTMAS EVE?

When looking at the church calendar this year, December 24th lands on a Sunday. Therefore, do we celebrate Advent IV or Christmas Eve on December 24? The answer is "Yes!" but I will return to the Advent IV/Christmas Eve question. First, I have to admit that the Church calendar can get confusing. The confusion is quickly evident anytime you try to figure out the date of Easter in any given year without googling it. By the way, page 880 in the *Book of Common Prayer* reveals the formula:



"Easter Day is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox on March 21, a date which is fixed in accordance with an ancient ecclesiastical computation, and which does not always correspond to the astronomical equinox. This full moon may happen on any date between March 21 and April 18 inclusive. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday following. But Easter Day cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25." [1].

The formula shared above is not used in the Jewish calculation for Passover, nor is the same formula used by the Orthodox Church in their calculation for setting Easter. Yet, there is a reason why we do what we do within the Church. For instance, the convoluted formula listed above for finding the date of Easter was to ensure that the holiday fell on a Sunday during early spring.

Now, we come back to the question posed in the title of this article. Specifically, in 2023, December 24 falls on a Sunday. Therefore, this year, is December 24 Advent 4 or Christmas Eve? And the answer is, "Yes!" It is both. While everyone knows Christmas Eve, what is Advent all about? According to an Episcopal Dictionary of the



Church on the National Church's website,

"[Advent is the] first season of the church year, beginning with the fourth Sunday before Christmas and continuing through the day before Christmas. The name derives from a Latin word for "coming." The season is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity and for the final coming of Christ in power and glory." [ii]



This Advent IV/Christmas Eve convergence naturally leads to the question, "How will St. James handle this?"

Sunday, December 24

- 8 a.m. We will be celebrating Advent 4 only. This service will be a spoken Rite I service, as we would do on any other Sunday. In other words, this is not a Christmas celebration (no "Silent Night" or "Joy to the World") but allows the important Advent season to come to a graceful conclusion.
- 10:30 a.m. This will be the Christmas Pageant service, just as we have done the past several years on Advent 4. While we will start the service with the familiar Advent hymn of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," we will officially switch to the Christmas celebration with the pageant and sing many favorite Christmas carols within the service. Look for more details to come regarding the pageant.

5 p.m. & We will have our beloved Christmas Eve 7:30 p.m. services at 5 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. with the full choir and guest musicians. We will also have a Carol Sing that starts at 4:30 p.m. before the 5 p.m. service.

Sunday, December 25

10:30 a.m. Once the presents are open and breakfast is consumed, join us at 10:30 a.m. on Christmas morning. Don't worry about dressing up, but rather join this small, intimate service for carols and lessons to ring in the Christmas Day celebration.

Finding the right balance can get tricky when the calendar has Advent IV and Christmas Eve sharing a day. However, we hope that this schedule will allow the good people of St. James to fully celebrate the Advent season while also lifting your voices in song and praise as together we declare,

"Joy to the World, the Lord is come. Let earth receive her King..."

FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION: TRAINING THE MUSICAL LEADERS OF TOMORROW DIRECTOR OF MUSIC SHANNON GALLIER

One of the defining characteristics of the Music Ministry at St. James is our emphasis on the musical education of children. This emphasis can be seen in our use of the curriculum, ethos, and philosophy of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM), an international organization that seeks to instill a love of singing and of great music. We aim to teach children not only how to sing, but why they should sing.

Every summer, the RSCM offers training courses around the country, where young musicians gather to experience working with some of the biggest names in sacred music. St. James has a history of our younger choristers attending these courses, and below we hear from Kaitlyn and Caroline Kelly, two veteran course-goers.

The Royal School of Church Music has been a key part of my life since I was 14 years old. I was first introduced to the RSCM Gulf Coast Summer Course through the St. James Treble Choir in 2016. The musical impact this course has had on our lives is enormous. We have always loved being a part of choirs, but after attending RSCM, there was a new spark there, and we knew it was something we wanted to continue forever!

Over the years at RSCM, I have met many other choristers from across the country. Many of whom, I met in middle school, and I am still very close friends with as a senior in college! When my younger sister, Caroline, was finally able to attend the course, she quickly understood everything I had shared with her about RSCM. After her first year, she fell in love with the traditions and fun as well! After attending the course as a chorister for 6 years, I became a counselor for the 2022 course.









LEADERS OF TOMORROW

The experience of the shift from chorister to counselor was incredibly rewarding; I grew up going to the course and loving my proctors, so I love having the ability to serve in that leadership role for our choristers now! The connections and friendships made at these courses are unlike any other, because of the common love for choral music shared through the week by every single person involved. Caroline has formed her own friendships after attending two summer courses and one winter course. We spent the week learning musical repertoire, singing several choral evensongs, and engaging in countless hours of fun activities!

After a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, seeing my friends, being back in Houston, and jumping right back into the busy schedule of RSCM week in 2021 was the highlight of my year, and continues to be each and every year! Although our experiences at RSCM vary, my sister and I share many of the core memories and connections to this wonderful organization. RSCM has been one of the greatest experiences of our lives, and we are forever grateful for the St. James Treble Choir that first introduced us to this life-changing course and our lifelong friends!

To learn the stories about Jesus.




James

GOING SOLAR AT THE MINISTRIES CENTER?

During the October meeting, the Vestry received an initial \$50k gift to begin exploring the possibility of installing solar panels. Conversations have begun to ask the right questions about the feasibility of this project regarding engineering, estimated costs, long-term savings, etc. This effort is born out of conversations on how St. James can diversify revenue sources and relieve potential future expenses. For instance, the third floor of the Ministries Center brings in nearly \$3,200 a month, with an additional amount being reserved for future revenue if the space is unoccupied. Similarly, the newly renovated parking lot is bringing in double the previous totals, with a projected income of over \$60k in 2023. This solar panel project can potentially offset the budget's electricity expenses in a significant way, as this cost has been one of the fastest growing over the past five years. Stay tuned for more information in the months ahead as the Vestry explores this possibility.
